ILR Testimonial: Prof. Dr. Karin Holm-Müller

I sat down with Professor <u>Holm-Müller</u> to discuss the AFECO program reaccreditation process and the future of the <u>Resource and Environmental Economics Chair</u>. A special thanks to Professor Holm-Müller for taking the time to contribute to the May 2019 newsletter!

A.T.: What does the AFECO reaccreditation process entail? **K. H-M.:** Our program will be evaluated by professors in our field from other universities as well as by a student representative and one person representing possible employers. They will look into documents and talk to students, the teaching staff and responsible persons from the faculty and the university (me in



this case). This is to make sure that our program fulfills all the requirements of the European Qualification Framework for master programs.

A.T.: How does a program prepare for the process?

K. H-M.: We started preparing for this already two years ago, when we asked the student representatives to organize a student survey. This has since been repeated once and has been accompanied by an alumni survey, so that we got quite a good overview about what works fine and what we should change. We- teaching staff and students- then met in the study commission and decided on how to implement these changes. Now we are writing all this up, so that an updated study program can be presented for reaccreditation as well as a report on how well the program works and why we made certain changes.

A.T.: With your departure from the Resource and Environmental Economics Chair, what does the immediate future of the chair look like?

K. H-M.: Sorry, this must be a rumor, which has arisen from I do not know where. I am staying at the chair till at least September 2022. I will most probably take a sabbatical in 2022, but I will not officially depart from the chair before September. Anyway, as Vice Rector for Studying and Teaching at Bonn University my teaching load is already very low and I personally only give one class in the whole AFECO program. All the other classes that the chair is now responsible for will gradually been taken over by the chair of professor Börner, Economics of Sustainable Land Use and Bioeconomy. We are in close contact and he does not plan any major changes in the next future.

A.T.: What do you hope for your chair and the AFECO program moving forward? **K. H-M.:** I will continue to work for the chair and the program for some years still together with my colleagues and our students. And I hope that together we will succeed in making this program even more attractive for students who are fascinated by the economic aspects of the agricultural and food sector locally and worldwide. We want our students to experience that we really have to say something to this point and that they also can contribute to solve the problems of feeding the world in a sustainable and fair manner. And I think we all feel that Bonn is a special location for this in Germany, something we did not really use as much as possible in the past. I also hope that you as students and former students manage to build up a network that will also help you in your future career or just allows you to keep track on friends of your Bonn time. And I think that this newsletter can also contribute to this end. So, thank you, Alex, for your work on it. And thanks to those who will follow and continue to inform our (current and perhaps recent) students to what might be interesting to them.
